# **MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT**



On behalf of the SCGIS Board of Directors, I am pleased to share our recent accomplishments through this 2020-2022 SCGIS Annual Report!

This report spans two fiscal years and includes a period of shifting patterns and lifestyles for many of us, who sought ways to live and work in a pandemic environment. For SCGIS, this also included dedicated efforts to better connect with each other virtually. While SCGIS continues to make in-person events a

priority, we have embraced new virtual programming opportunities that have allowed broader connections with our large and growing international community.

As one example, our virtual 2021 SCGIS Conference garnered record attendance of nearly 700 registrants from 14 countries who shared amazing conservation GIS work from around the world! SCGIS also held our first-ever virtual Global Scholars Program with 12 International Scholars who gained or renewed a wide breadth of technical skills that each will leverage to increase conservation GIS capacity in their own country or region.

SCGIS continues to grow support for regional chapters, including many that have expanded engagement and networking in virtual ways, as well as a new Canada Chapter. We launched a new SCGIS website with added efforts to create a more consistent SCGIS brand, and we continued to expand social media efforts to share information and opportunities.

In 2022, we celebrated the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of SCGIS as an organization! At our annual conference, we enjoyed a special message from Esri's President Jack Dangermond, who has provided tremendous support to SCGIS from the very beginning. We also held a "SCGIS at 25 Years" session including this <u>special video</u> from Charles Convis that shares the heritage of SCGIS and documents examples of the special connections that are so meaningful to our community.

I want to share my appreciation for the amazing efforts of more than 90 volunteers that support all SCGIS programmatic activities! Please explore our work in this report, reach out to engage, and consider joining us to support and grow a worldwide conservation GIS community.

The mission of the Society for Conservation GIS (SCGIS) is to support and grow an inclusive global community using geospatial technology for conservation of biodiversity, natural environments, and cultural heritage. In 2022, SCGIS was proud to celebrate its 25th anniversary! Borrowing from the words of Charles Convis, one of the founders of SCGIS, "the heart of SCGIS is to attract gifted, creative individuals with a strong vision and support them to achieve their dreams." Since 1997, SCGIS has built and grown a global community for geospatial technology in support of conservation, accomplished through dedicated work of our committees, talented volunteers, and community engagement of our members.

Two flagship SCGIS programs organized each year are the <u>Global Scholars Program</u> and the SCGIS <u>Annual International Conference</u>. SCGIS also has seven all-volunteer committees to support its programming. We present highlights from 2020-2022 for the Global Scholars Program, Annual Conference, and the work of our committees below.

# **GLOBAL SCHOLARS PROGRAM**

Since 1997, the SCGIS Global Scholars Program has supported conservation GIS practitioners from around the world in advancing their technical skills and connecting with an international community of practice. These scholars are conservation GIS leaders, using their talents to pursue effective science, education and change local communities, and discover new ways of protecting species and landscapes. In addition, the SCGIS Train the Trainer (TTT) program supports past scholars with advanced training to become certified SCGIS instructors. They assist the scholarship program with instruction and work to expand GIS capacity in their local region.

The 2021 Global Scholars Program was held virtually for the first time ever due to the global pandemic. SCGIS welcomed accomplished scholars from 12 countries (Bhutan, Botswana, Cameroon, Chile, Ecuador, India, Japan, Malaysia, New Zealand, Tanzania, Ukraine, and the United States) and two honors recipients. Training included courses focused on ArcGIS Pro, ArcGIS Online, and web application development and use. The virtual format enabled greater participation from our TTTs, who assisted with the training program. The virtual format also presented certain challenges in teaching specialized technical skills, greatly revealing the importance of in-person connection in a learning environment. SCGIS is reviewing lessons learned and continues to seek novel ways to connect participants each year in a cohort model.

With significant support and leadership from the Southern Africa SCGIS Chapter and Board member Mervyn Lotter, the 2022 Global Scholars Program trained 20 scholars and two new Train-the-Trainers (TTTs) during a two-week course on ArcGIS Pro for environmental analysis at the South African Wildlife College, South Africa in September 2022. In addition, the SCGIS Latin America Chapter hosted seven short training courses in South America where more than 40 students from seven different countries were trained on GIS and mobile applications. Moreover, seven scholars participated in a two-week program in Córdoba, Argentina where they learned ArcGIS Pro, GeoApps, and StoryMaps. The National University of Río Cuarto (UNRC), Argentina, and the Caburé-í Foundation of Argentina also supported the training. # **SCGIS ANNUAL CONFERENCES**

The Annual International Conference was held virtually in both 2021 and 2022. Each conference was hosted on a virtual platform that promoted connection and engagement by conference attendees and provided a live-stream video and archive of all sessions. With this online format, it was exciting to have so many from our community engaged globally to share their work, lived experiences, and expertise. The 2021 Conference had 672 registrants from over 14 countries, which is the highest participation we have ever seen at an SCGIS Conference. The conference consisted of workshops, two keynote speakers, updates from global scholars, SCGIS chapter sessions, community presentations, and focused panel discussions. Our keynote speakers were Molly Burhans and Walter Jetz who discussed the brilliant work they are doing to share information across networks in support of conservation globally.

Our 25th Anniversary 2022 Annual Conference had attendees from more than 25 countries! The opening keynote featured a special video by Esri's President, Jack Dangermond, to commemorate our special anniversary. SCGIS Founder Charles Convis also <u>composed a video</u>

to share the history of SCGIS and celebrate its 25-year journey. The conference also included seven technical workshops focused on spatial analysis and remote sensing and featured eight different curated sessions spanning multiple conservation GIS topics. In addition, a selection of SCGIS chapters hosted inperson networking events in conjunction with the conference.

# **HIGHLIGHTS FROM SCGIS COMMITTEES**

## **COMMUNICATIONS**

The SCGIS Communications Committee leads our outreach efforts, including the management of SCGIS's social media platforms. Committee volunteers work to share news and events, as well as to pilot projects that provide resources to meet the academic, career, networking, and other interests of our membership. During 2021, our Communications Committee debuted an Academic Programs Database to highlight educational pathways that are relevant to the interests of our membership with an environmental and geospatial emphasis. Currently, the database focuses on programs available in the United States with entries submitted by SCGIS volunteers. The Communications Committee also leads a recurring <u>Webinar Series</u>, co-sponsored by the <u>Conservation Biology Institute (CBI</u>). In the spring of 2021, we hosted five webinars on cutting edge topics with over 2800 registrants. There was particular interest in the topic of effective partnerships with Indigenous communities with over 1100 registrants for this webinar alone. CBI also partnered with SCGIS to co-host two virtual meetups in 2021 and one in 2022 for members to network and share their research with the broader conservation community.

# **U.S. AND CANADA REGIONAL CHAPTERS**

Through the creation of local and regional chapters, SCGIS members unite to share their work and build collaborative spaces within our community. On that note, we are very proud to announce the formation of the SCGIS Canada Chapter. Thank you to Heather Peacock and Nicole Yeung for establishing and leading this newly formed group!

As more outdoor group events started to occur in 2022, some chapters started resuming inperson outdoor networking events. The Washington DC Chapter, Portland Chapter, and New York/New Jersey Chapter each offered special in-person meetups in conjunction with the 2022 25th Anniversary Conference. The New York/New Jersey Chapter also offered a series of regional hikes for its members.

# FINANCIAL AND MEMBERSHIP SUMMARY

**Financial Summary:** SCGIS had total net assets of **\$360,156** as of September 30, 2021 and **\$324,119** as of September 30, 2022. Net income for fiscal year FY20-21 was **\$50,204** and net income for FY21-22 was **-\$38,911**. The Society is supported by revenue from investment

income, donors and grants, membership fees, and event fees. Higher expenditures for FY21-22 included planned onetime expenses for a new SCGIS website. While the global pandemic caused reduced revenue from events and membership, SCGIS budgeted carefully and has maintained a solid financial position with sufficient assets to support its programmatic activities.



#### **Membership Summary:**

SCGIS had 597 members in 2021 and 451 members in 2022. The membership decrease was largely driven by a lower number of new members (shown in the dark green bars at the bottom of the graph below). The 2022 renewal rate in memberships also experienced a decrease of 13% compared to 2021. Although the pandemic inspired SCGIS to promote



new virtual initiatives to better connect with new and renewing members, the lack of inperson events has significantly affected membership numbers. SCGIS plans to resume inperson conferences again in 2024 to better connect with new and renewing members.

# **SUPPORT AND DONATIONS**

SCGIS depends heavily upon membership revenue and donor support to continue our activities and mission. Several organizations and individuals have donated both in-kind and financial support to help sustain SCGIS's programmatic activities. We are very grateful for their contributions and support!
